#### **INTRODUCTION**

elcome to the Ghana Union Midlands (GUM) Newsletter, the maiden edition this year. As you are all aware, we suspended publication of the hard copies of our newsletter nearly 18 months ago due to high production and printing costs. Since then, we have received numerous enquiries about the publication of our newsletters. As a result, we took the decision to resume the publication of the newsletters but this time to distribute them in an

electronic form. However, we may consider printing small number of hard copies of the newsletters upon request. In return, we will ask for a small donation towards the printing cost from members requesting this format.

The frequently asked question by most Ghanaians is whether GUM is the same as the Birmingham Union? The simple answer to this question is NO. They are two separate entities. In this edition, we will try and explain the differences between GUM, the regional umbrella body, the Birmingham Union and their respective roles.

We will also update you with current and past news, including our programme of activities for 2016, membership dues, Lottery funding for the community cohesion project, Ghana @59 independence anniversary, the youth chapter, prayer group and the bereavement scheme, which will be of interest to our members and audience.

We look forward to receiving your review and feedback on this new format so that the next edition could be improved.

## ABOUT GUM The Regional umbrella Body

hana Union Midlands(GUM), the regional umbrella body, is the regional voice for the Ghanaian community in the Midlands region. The late President of Ghana, His Excellency Professor John Atta Mills' memorial service in August 2012, was the catalyst that brought together the various Ghanaian groups operating in the Midlands region under one roof. It was also the beginning of the formation of the regional umbrella body for all the Ghanaian groups in the Midlands region.

A meeting was arranged and held in Birmingham in October 2012, after the memorial service, where all the groups that participated in the memorial service attended. It was unanimously agreed at the meeting to form a regional umbrella body in the Midlands region, in order to present a collective and unified voice for the Ghanaian groups. It was believed the formation of a regional umbrella body would help us to deal effectively with local authorities, statutory bodies, UK policy makers, and the Ghana High Commission on matters affecting the Ghanaian community in general, in the region. We are certain that the concept of a regional umbrella body allows member groups to work effectively together as a 'hub and spokes' network organisation.

This 'hub and spokes' model allows each group within the umbrella body to retain its autonomy and identity in managing its affairs at local level. Working in collaboration in a coordinated way provides us with a unified voice for all the Ghanaian groups in the Midlands region; more than any single group could do on its own.

Building a general consensus is a

time-consuming and difficult process in the formation of any community group with diverse interests. Since 2012, the journey to become a regional umbrella body for the various Ghanaian groups operating in the Midlands region has been a difficult and tortuous task. The journey was marked by a process of ironing out differences amongst the various interest groups through hard negotiations and agreements. Eventually, on the 31st January 2015, we achieved

our main goal of forming a

regional umbrella body in the

Midlands region for Ghanaian

groups.

An overwhelming majority of the founding members of the regional umbrella body finally appended their signature to a constitution to agree on a legal document that binds all the members of the regional umbrella body. Following the adoption of the constitution, the umbrella body was later registered as a charity with the Charity Commission in April 2015.

#### Main Functions of the Regional Umbrella Body

The regional umbrella body will perform the following functions to:

- (i) Bring together the various Ghanaian Unions, Associations and other Groups under one regional umbrella body, and foster good relationships and understanding amongst the various groups which support the Ghanaian community in the Midlands region.
- (ii) Provide a forum for GUM network member organisations and other Ghanaian groups in the Midlands to co-ordinate activities, and share resources, expertise, information and experience in order to enhance their common goal of providing support for the Ghanaian community in the Midlands region.
- (iii) Offer support and advice on management, financial management, funding governance and advocacy: and provide consultancy and training to assist the umbrella member groups to efficiently manage and run their respective unions or associations in their respective localities in the Midlands region, and also to promote good practice amongst the GUM membership.
- (iv) Organise an annual conference to discuss major issues affecting the Ghanaian community in the Midlands region to promote community development and cohesion.
- (v) Raise the profile and status of GUM as the sole recognised umbrella body that represents the various Ghanaian Unions, Associations and Groups in the Midlands region,

- and liaise with the United Kingdom Government, Local Authorities within the United Kingdom and other statutory agencies, on behalf of the said Ghanaian Unions, Associations and Groups.
- (vi) Provide a united voice for GUM and its associated member groups by which the views of GUM and also the views of other Ghanaian unions and associations relating to the needs of the Ghanaian community will be heard in policy circles by UK policy makers and statutory agencies.

#### Membership of the Regional Umbrella Body

Membership of the umbrella body is open to any Ghanaian group in the Midlands region that is properly constituted or working towards it, and wishing to join GUM to further its mission, goals and objectives. The Ghanaian groups are classified as affiliated members when they become members of the umbrella body. Membership of the umbrella body is also open to non- Ghanaian groups, who must be properly constituted or working towards it. Such groups are classified as associate members. All groups wishing to become prospective members of the umbrella body are required to complete a membership registration form.

he Ghana Union Greater
Birmingham is a community
based organisation dedicated
to supporting human infrastructure
development that maximises and
strengthens community building. Its
mission is to mobilise the Ghanaian
community in Birmingham and its
environs to build a strong human
infrastructure and vibrant
community to support each other,
and the Ghanaian community in
general.

It also provides welfare support to improve the conditions of its members in Birmingham and its environs. The union's work is driven by a passionate belief that all its members have a collective responsibility towards each other, and also to support the Ghanaian community in general.

The Union has had a rather chequered history in its 49 years of existence. During this period, the union has gone through different stages of development and growth. It started around 1967 as the Birmingham African Students' Union supporting Ghanaian students, and also other African nationals studying in Birmingham at that time. It later evolved in the mid-1970s as the 'Ghana Union Birmingham' as a result of the increased numbers, and diversity of the Ghanaian community in the city of Birmingham and its environs. In those days, there were hardly any Ghana Union activities in the West Midlands region, and Birmingham was the centre of attraction where major Ghanaian activities took place for the Ghanaian community in the Midlands region. Today things are different as we now have a growing number of Ghanaians residing across the Midlands region. This has also resulted in the formation of various Ghanaian unions. associations, churches and other groups in the Midlands region.

In 2010, the Ghana Union Birmingham (GUB), changed direction in the next stage of its development, and took on a new and challenging role in bringing together, all the major Ghanaian groups in the Midlands region under one roof. GUB assumed a new name 'Ghana Union Midlands' (GUM) to reflect its ambition to lead the formation of a regional umbrella group. At this point, GUM took on a 'dual role' in looking after its Birmingham members, whilst pursuing the formation of a regional umbrella body to provide a unified voice for the Ghanaian and friends of Ghana community. This 'dual role' model led to some concerns regarding GUM's 'modus operandi' and types of membership, which included groups and also individuals. Despite attempts to clarify the structure of GUM as an umbrella organisation with a 'Birmingham Group' serving as the Secretariat, the message did not resonate with people, and hence the confusion of synonymously referring to GUM as the Birmingham Union.

Having accomplished the task of forming a new regional umbrella body, it has now become necessary to resolve the confusion by clearly distinguishing between the Birmingham Union and GUM. The Birmingham Union has now relinquished its caretaker role of GUM, and has assumed the same status as any of the groups affiliated to GUM, the regional umbrella body. The Birmingham Union has now been reconstituted as the 'Ghana Union Greater Birmingham' to reflect the City's new administrative jurisdiction which includes Birmingham city and its environs. The 'Ghana Union Greater Birmingham' is temporarily acting as the secretariat for the umbrella body, until an administrative office and a new secretariat is established to take over the affairs for the regional umbrella body.

## **<b>Updates**

#### End of Project Report-Community Enhancement and Cohesion Project

Following successful application to the National Lottery (Awards for All) last year, GUM was awarded a grant for the Community Enhancement and Cohesion Project. This grant enabled GUM to deliver a two day conference to promote Black History Month in October 2015 to help improve community cohesion.

#### The key objectives set for the project were:

- a. To promote knowledge of black history, culture and heritage and to showcase and acknowledge individual achievements and contributions that Black Britons of African origin, past and present have made to British society.
- **b.** To promote community cohesion and the need for people from diverse communities to coexist peacefully together.



GUM set out to implement the project activities following the approval of the funding for the project. Throughout this journey, elaborate preparations were put together to kick-start the project. Finally, this journey has ended, and GUM was able to successfully deliver the project under the terms and conditions which the grant was given.

As part of the terms and conditions of the grant aid, organisations that have been awarded a grant are required to produce at the end of the project, a report detailing how the Lottery funds were used to implement the project, and also to account for the grant given.

We are pleased to let our members know that GUM was able to meet these key requirements. In January 2016, we successfully submitted our End of Project Report to National Lottery (Awards for All)within the time frame for the submission of the report. We have since received confirmation from National Lottery that our report has been accepted, and our project has now formally been closed. The GUM executives would like to take this opportunity to thank our members, and all those who participated in the two day conference to make it a success for us.



special flag raising ceremony was held on Sunday 6th March 2016 at the forecourt of the Birmingham City Council by the Lord Mayor, Councillor Raymond Hassall. This event was organised by Ghana Union Midlands, and hosted by Birmingham City Council as part of the celebrations of Ghana's 59th Independence Anniversary from British colonial rule.

This was an historic occasion for GUM in the sense that it was the first time such an event has been hosted by the City Council for the Ghanaian community and the Union in our 49 years of existence in Birmingham. It was pleasing for us to note that 40 people in a jubilant mood braved the cold weather to attend this special occasion.



Members were punctual and there were no latecomers to the event. By 8:45am all our members had assembled at the forecourt of the Council House waiting to receive the Lord Mayor. The punctuality of our members at the event was historic,





and also a record in itself. At 9:00am prompt, the Lord Mayor hoisted the flag of Ghana with jubilant cheers from our members and friends of Ghana. This was later followed by an informal tea/coffee session, where members interacted with the Lord Mayor and guests



he successful flag raising event on Sunday 6th March by the Lord Mayor of Birmingham at the Council House was the first part of the celebrations to mark Ghana's 59th Independence anniversary event. The second part of the celebrations followed later with a Dinner Dance on Saturday 12th March, which was held at the Brasshouse Community Centre. Ghana Union Greater Birmingham took the lead role to organise this event on behalf of GUM, the umbrella body.

The weather was relatively warm and nearly 150 members, guests and friends of Ghana trooped to the Brasshouse Centre to celebrate the occasion in a great style. This year's event was a low key affair without the usual representation from the Ghana High Commission. However, the High Commissioner's speech was read at the event by the GUM President on behalf of Mr Victor Smith, the High Commissioner.

What a big blast we had despite the fact that the event was meant to be a low key affair. The atmosphere was terrific with plenty of sumptuous food and drinks available for all to enjoy. The music was fantastic too with DJ Stone delighting the audience with a combination of old and modern music to satisfy the varied tastes of the audience. It was pleasing to see our elderly members who normally don't dance get up on their feet to dance the night away and enjoy themselves. The youth were not to be outdone, and they also displayed their dancing skills to the delight of all. Commonwealth Day

he Commonwealth is an organisation made up of 53 member states that were mostly territories of the former British Empire. The organisation formally started in 1949, which established the member states as 'free and equal'. Queen Elizabeth II is the Head of the Commonwealth.

Commonwealth Day is held on the second Monday in March every year. It is an opportunity for individuals, communities and organisations to promote shared Commonwealth values of peace, democracy and equality, and to celebrate the association's rich diversity. Commonwealth Day this year was on Monday 14th March 2016. The Birmingham Commonwealth Association, of which GUM is a member, held a three part events on the day to celebrate the occasion. The first part of the event proceeded with raising the Commonwealth Flag outside the Birmingham City Council House, in Victoria Square, at 9.30am

The second part of the celebratory event was linked with the presentation of British citizenship certificates to mark the Commonwealth Day. 27 people from Commonwealth countries after swearing an oath of allegiance to Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II and her heirs, received their certificates from the Lord Mayor of Birmingham, and became the city's newest British citizens. It is pleasing to note that one of the recipients is of Ghanaian origin. At the event, Dr Quaye Botchway, the GUM President and representing the Birmingham Commonwealth Association on this occasion, delivered a speech on one of the Commonwealth values regarding tolerance, respect and understanding. During the ceremony, Dr Botchway and Odehye Nana Kwasi Ofei, GUM President and Vice President respectively later presented framed certificates composed by the Birmingham Commonwealth Association to the recipients who had been granted British citizenship.



The third part of the event was a special dinner later in the evening (7:30pm) to round off the Commonwealth Day event in Birmingham. The Birmingham Commonwealth Association comprises three main groups, which are: Education, Trade & Business; and communities, who all sent delegates to the dinner. GUM is part of the communities group. Dr Quaye Botchway and Odehye Nana Kwasi Ofei represented GUM, the umbrella body, whereas Mrs Victoria Clegg and Mr Osei Bempong Mensa represented the Ghana Union Greater Birmingham at the dinner.

### Gum Bereavement Scheme



re you aware of the GUM Bereavement Scheme? In May2015, we formally launched our Bereavement Scheme as part of our welfare support after wide consultation with our members. The scheme is now managed by Ghana Union Greater Birmingham on behalf of GUM.

#### What is the Scheme about?

This is a voluntary and not for profit scheme, which is a form of 'communal' assistance that is designed to support members in the event of bereavement. The aim of the GUM Bereavement Scheme is to provide financial support, and to serve as a kind of 'insurance policy' for members in the event of the death of a member, or close family relative of a member.

#### How the scheme works

A special Bereavement Fund has been set up purposely for the scheme to provide financial assistance to members who have applied voluntarily and been accepted onto the scheme. Members of the scheme will be required to make regular payments into the Bereavement Fund. Contributions or premiums collected from participating members of the scheme will be paid into this fund. This money will be used to pay out Death Benefit Entitlements from the fund.

#### How much do I have to contribute?

We have a plan called the flexible premium (contribution). Under this plan, when you join the scheme, you will be asked to pay an initial amount of £20.00, or an amount determined by the scheme administrators, as your 'seed capital' into a Bereavement Fund. You will not be asked to pay any premiums until the death of a member or his/her close relative. When such a death occurs, every participating member of the scheme (except the bereaved) will be required to pay a fixed amount into the bereavement fund. The money collected will be used to pay out the bereavement entitlements to the bereaved member.

#### **Qualifying Period**

Every registered member of the Scheme is required to serve a qualifying period. Upon registration and acceptance onto the scheme, a participating member agrees to serve a qualifying period of three months before he or she can make a claim to receive benefit entitlements when bereaved.

#### Registration

Any member interested to join the scheme will be required to complete an application form before he can be a member of the scheme.

#### Agreement

A member will be required to sign an agreement with GUM to participate in the scheme when his or her application has been accepted. Both parties are expected to respect and comply fully with the terms of the agreement.

#### How much will I be paid when I am bereaved?

The table below are the indicative rates of contributions and entitlements when a member of the scheme suffers bereavement. Please note that the rates of entitlements are likely to increase as the number of participants in the scheme increases.

Member and Designated Relative	Flexible Contribution (premium) rates per member upon death	Benefit entitlement upon death
GUM Member of the Scheme(Payable to the member next of kin)	£30.00	£600.00
Member's Husband or Wife	£25.00	£500.00
Member's natural or adopted children ( Maximum three children)	£20.00	£400.00
Member's natural father/ mother or persons nominated to serve as parents	£15.00	£300.00
Member's close siblings i.e. brother and or sister (No more than two siblings)	£10.00	£200.00

**NB:** The premium contributions and benefit entitlement rates are currently based on a minimum number of 20 members, who have voluntarily signed up to participate in the first year of the scheme. However, the benefit entitlements rates payable to participants are likely to go up when the minimum number of participants increases.

#### My Experience with Ghana Union Y outh Chapter

I heard about GUM through a friend and she persuaded me to join the youth chapter. I like the way that GUM is trying to bring Ghanaian youth together and also to support us through various activities. I also like the manner GUM is educating us to be aware of, and also proud of the Ghanaian culture and traditions, which I believe will help us to preserve our Ghanaian identity.

I became a member of the Youth Chapter in January 2016, and since then I have made new friends to encourage us to talk about ourselves, and also to share our life experiences. I have found that taking part in the Youth Chapter's activities help me to relieve stress. My experience with the Youth Chapter is that I have met people from different backgrounds, with many of whom I share similar interests in music and culture.
